

Why you should make a will

It is estimated that only 36% of people have made a will, yet the repercussions of not having one can have significant consequences. Louise Salisbury outlines some of the more important issues that may arise if you do not have a will:

- Your assets may not pass to the people you care about the most.
- Your estate may be administered by people you have not chosen.
- · You cannot leave treasured items to named beneficiaries.
- You cannot appoint guardians for young children.
- You cannot put age restrictions on gifts to children or young adults so they could receive large sums of money at a young age.
- You cannot use trusts to protect your assets or vulnerable relatives.
- You cannot set out what funeral arrangements you want.
- You cannot benefit your favourite charities.
- You may miss opportunities to plan to avoid inheritance tax or care home fees.
- In some cases your entire estate could pass to the crown.
